Put Our Words into Action on April 25

Council 5 wraps up a month of volunteer action with a celebration, march, and community service project in St. Paul on Saturday April 25.

The activities honor our union's legacy with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., the 1968 Memphis sanitation workers' strike, and our continuing fight for workers' rights and social and economic justice.

Members, families, and friends can join us for a spring clean-up in St. Paul's Rondo neighborhood. Then, we'll gather for lunch and a program that includes AFSCME's Bill Lucy (who helped the sanitation workers gain a union) and the film "At the River I Stand" (which chronicles Dr. King's last days).

Join Fast-Food Workers April 15

AFSCME locals at the University of Minnesota help lead a "unity march" on Wednesday April 15 to support fast-food workers in their "Fight for 15." Fast-food workers are seeking policies that guarantee wages of at least \$15 an hour, earned sick time, fair scheduling, and an end to wage theft.

Filmmaker Sam Mayfield will lead a panel discussion as Labor Movie Night holds a special showing on the University of Minnesota's East Bank.

Rubber Meets the Road April 16

Time is running out to make our voices heard about the urgent need for reliable transportation funding for Minnesota. We've got two chances to do that on Thursday April 16.

- Move MN holds a lunch-hour rally on the Capitol lawn from noon-1 p.m. Move MN is a statewide coalition of AFSCME and more than 200 other organizations pushing a comprehensive, longterm transportation solution for Minnesota.
- Afterward, the Minnesota AFL-CIO pushes transportation as a priority during its "Working Families Day on the Hill," from 1-3:30 p.m. Meet at 175 W. Aurora Ave., St. Paul.
