



Legislature Approves AFSCME State Contracts

AFSCME state employee contracts were approved by lawmakers before the Legislature adjourned late Sunday night. The best news is that the three contract bills are “clean” of the poison pills House Republicans had tried to pass.

Gov. Dayton is expected to sign these contract bills covering nearly 18,000 workers in corrections, radio communications and multi-units.

We are grateful to Gov. Dayton, Sen. Jim Metzen, and Reps. Leon Lillie and Debra Hilstrom for their persistent support for all state employees and our labor agreements.

We are disgusted by the House Republicans who voted against our multi-unit labor agreement. The TERRIBLE 25 include: House Speaker Kurt Daudt and Reps. Divided Government Failed Minnesota

The Legislature adjourned late Sunday night with a disappointing midnight meltdown. House Republicans operated in secret and pushed their work against the constitutional deadline. Republican leaders failed to get their job done and should be voted out for their failure to pass transportation and bonding bills – two of the most important things that Minnesotans need to be healthy and safe.

What's next? Gov. Mark Dayton said Monday he's willing to consider calling a special session to finish the bonding and transportation work the Legislature did not complete. But he's in no hurry – and with the sole authority to call a special session, he's in a position to drive a hard bargain that protects public workers and the people of Minnesota.
