Senate Approves State Contracts

Contracts for 18,000 state employees in AFSCME passed the Minnesota Senate on Feb. 7. The 2011-2013 contracts also cleared several House committees, with the full House expected to vote on Feb. 14.

If the contracts pass the House, their final stop is a conference committee before moving to Gov. Dayton for his signature.

Locals Vote on New Contracts

City of Maplewood. Members in this unit of Local 2725 vote this week on a two-year contract through 2014. The tentative agreement includes pay raises of 1 percent retroactive to Jan. 1, another 1 percent on July 1, and 2 percent on Jan. 1, 2014.

Health-insurance premiums stay the same for 2013 for employees who participate in a wellness plan. The proposal adds 4 more hours of annual holiday pay, and increases life insurance by \$5,000.

City of Stillwater. Members in this unit of Local 517 ratified a three-year contract through 2014. The deal provides 2 percent pay raises in 2013 and 2014; increases the pay for employees who work on a holiday (to double-time-and-a-half); extends a \$20,000 life-insurance policy to age 70 for full-time employees; maintains fully paid individual health insurance; and agrees to a joint study of the health-insurance plan.

University of Minnesota Physicians. Members in this unit of Local 1164 vote this week on a contract through July 31, 2016. The tentative agreement guarantees pay raises for all employees every year; keeps the employee's share of health-insurance premiums the same for all three years; increases pay for working on a holiday; and increases shift and weekend differential by 35 to 50 cents an hour.

The proposal's pay raises are a combination of step and longevity increases, general increases, and additional "market-based adjustments" for some jobs. At a minimum, employee pay will increase 1.75 percent in 2013, 1.5 percent in 2014, and 1.25 percent in 2015. Additional increases mean individual raises and range from about 2.5 percent to 6.5 percent.

Local 1719 Leader Dean Enge Dies

Dean Enge, a former president and longtime activist of Local 1719, died Jan. 28 of cancer. Dean was a senior correctional officer at the Hennepin County Adult Correctional Facility, where he worked for 26 years. He also was a former president of the Hennepin County Policy Committee. Dean is survived by his wife, Michelle, and daughter, Melanie.

Clear Up Confusion on 'ObamaCare'

Want to understand how exchanges, MinnesotaCare, and other parts of health insurance will work once the Affordable Care Act takes full effect next year? River Valley Action will provide answers at a free forum Feb. 25 in Oakdale.

DHS officials Carole Backstrom and Trudy Ohnsorg; the Minnesota Budget Project's Christina Wessel; and former legislator Julie Bunn will speak. They'll share information about "ObamaCare" and give advice on how you can influence decisions in the Legislature.
